

The month of April was very much a month of visiting castles. Over the Easter holidays we made one of our regular visits to Conwy and Caernarfon Castles, courtesy of our trusty Cadw membership and Tesco Clubcard reward points! And later in the month, we ventured further north to visit Alnwick Castle in Northumberland, home of the Duke and Duchess of Northumberland, and more recently, a filming location for Harry Potter and Downton Abbey. Finally, we spent a lovely morning exploring the historic Edinburgh Castle, high upon Castle Rock and dominating the Old Town.

Though many people associate castles with princesses and fairy tales, what we think of as ancient castles are actually examples of military fortresses. Castles were built on strategic, defensible locations, generally on high ground that afforded a long line of sight of the surrounding land. They contained tall towers that provided 360 degrees of visibility so lookouts could see any approaching threat far in advance.

Castles are traditionally surrounded by moats, which were often simply deep dry ditches meant to impede an invading force's entrance. Moats also served the purpose of further elevating the entire structure of the fortress by excavating the surrounding area down 12 to 15 feet.

Inside the moat, the castle would have been surrounded by high and thick walls around which you would find arrow slits also known as loopholes. From the exterior they are narrow, usually vertical, slots in the wall, but on the inside, they would be larger openings that would allow archers to draw back their bows and fire arrow after arrow into advancing forces.

Castles were generally built in ever elevating concentric sections so that defenders could flee further inward and upward if the exterior fortifications didn't hold against enemy attack. And the top of the castle was meant to provide a fortified space for cannons and other artillery so that soldiers could duck behind the wall and place the cannon barrel through the gap as they loaded and fired their weapons.

In Biblical times, ancient cities often protected their citizens from a military attack by building high walls to surround fortresses and create a safe atmosphere in people's lives where communities could have the freedom to thrive. The defence of cities and trade centres has been important for centuries and the citadel was the fortress of the ancient world, appearing in the cities of Egypt, Greece, and the Roman empire.

In the Book of Psalms, one of the overriding themes is that of God's protection and provision and the Lord is referred to as a rock around 20 times because of the security he provides for those who trust in him.

Psalm 31 refers to the Lord as both a 'refuge' and a 'fortress.' A 'refuge' meaning a place where people can fall back to in times of hardship or danger and a 'fortress' being a building designed for battle. It provides safety from an attacking enemy and gives those inside the means to withstand an assault. And Psalm 46

reminds us that 'God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.'

Many of the Psalms were thought to have been composed by King David, who often viewed God as his rock, his fortress, his refuge and his shield. In Psalm 57 when David, hiding in the rocks and caves of the desert from Saul's attackers, says 'God is my fortress,' he is saying that, despite the absence of fortified walls, he is safe because of God. He is putting his trust in God, and understanding that God will protect him just as surely as if he were in the highest tower in a well-armed, perfectly situated fortress.

But you don't have to be the King of Israel to receive God's protection. We can seek refuge in him as our fortress at any time in our lives. God is our fortress, a strong fortress to save us and protect us with his love. In a fortress, you are safe. Things can attack but the walls will hold. It's the same with God. No matter what happens, no matter what you're facing, you can find refuge in God. Make him your fortress. When you are under attack, go to God, you are always safe with him and nothing can ever separate you from God. He is always there, bringing peace in the midst of chaos, and the ultimate security offered by God is eternal. God is our rock and our strength, a refuge and a strong fortress for us all.

The Lord is my protector; he is my strong fortress. My God is my protection, and with him I am safe. He protects me like a shield; he defends me and keeps me safe. Psalm 18:2 With all good wishes - Liz
